he idea of passing the torch to lay people is a part of the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND) educational process. "Through education, people are transformed, educated, and in turn, change the world. Education has a ripple effect. Therefore, the idea of passing on the torch is one of those ripple effects," said Sister Beatriz Martinez, SSND United Nations -Non-Governmental Organization (U.N.-NGO) Representative. SSND ministries such as, Global Partners: Runnings Waters (GPRW), Milwaukee, and the Living Earth Center (LEC), Mankato, Minnesota, are two ministries where the next generation of vivacious and dynamic leaders have moved to take the torch.

Meet Elizabeth Mueller

Elizabeth Mueller is a 25-year-old from Milwaukee, who studied at Marquette University where she doublemajored in political science and international affairs. She first became involved with Global Partners: Runnings Waters (GPRW) back in 2014, when her mother, who is a history teacher at Dominican High School

in Whitefish Bay, Wisconsin, partnered with Sister Jan Gregorcich, co-founder of GPRW, to coordinate a trip to Guatemala. Elizabeth was fortunate to be able to go on the trip, where she met, listened to and learned from the community leaders in Guatemala. GPRW works in partnership with communities in Latin America to initiate and complete water, food, education and health projects. They listen to local community members



and focus on being a source of positivity and empowerment by offering financial, cultural and spiritual resources. At this time, GPRW has completed more than 148 clean water projects, impacting the lives of over 310,000 people in rural and urban communities in Latin America.

Elizabeth is passionate about engaging, connecting and learning. "Not only is care of creation very important to me. I think it is also very much 'front of mind,' for a lot of young adults. We value our planet and want to take better care of it. Whether it's taking more aggressive action to fight climate change, or campaigning for quality and accessible healthcare for all, we are leading movements, raising awareness and influencing policies," said Elizabeth. Currently, Elizabeth and Dr. Jason Meyler are codirectors at GPRW

Meet Laura Peterson

In her fourth year as director of the Living Earth Center (LEC), Laura Peterson earned a master's degree in experiential education at Minnesota State University, Mankato. As an undergraduate, she studied international relations at Franklin University, Switzerland. The Denver native also worked with

farmers in Sub-Saharan Africa for about a year after graduating from Franklin University and before moving to rural Minnesota. Laura brings a passion for education and cross-cultural engagement, as she strives to bring people together to share common ground through the two acres of community gardens. LEC also holds educational workshops, community conversations and conferences. as the focus is on environmental and social sustainable solutions. According to Laura, "It's this concept of coming together; even though they are growing food and sharing food that can be eaten, what they are also doing is creating a connection. This idea of connection is fundamental because it bridges that concept of difference and makes us one."

Commission on the Status of Women, the High-Level Political Forum (HLPF), and the Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues. "During these events, we, along with other NGOs, can submit written or oral statements to advocate for specific local or global pressing issues," said Sister Beatriz.

SSND firmly believe care of creation is vital for all living beings on

the planet. According to Sister Beatriz, we are obligated to use the Earth's gifts responsibly and to recognize the interconnection of all living beings and nature. We need each other. We depend on each other. Pope Francis calls us to, "cooperate as instruments of God for the care of creation, each according to his or her own culture, experience, involvements, and talents" (Laudato si' [LS] 14). Part of recognizing our interconnection is understanding the need for inclusive and sustainable communities. Inclusive communities welcome, accept and honor the dignity of all peoples and nature, by trusting each other's


Hopefully, the knowledge that the sisters are praying for you and those hurting in our world, gives you a sense of peace and renewed optimism, bringing you closer to God.

SOURCES OF GIFT INCOME




Later in life, Jim owned a floral shop. On March 25, 1963, the sisters changed their habits from the starched wimples and wide veils to a softer, more modified version. In response, Jim delivered a red rose corsage for each sister at St. John de Nepomuc. The sisters were quite surprised.

Jim continued to stay connected with one of his grade school teachers, Sister James Marie O'Connor. One St. Patrick's Day. he even wired flowers to her in Rome. His sense of humor was evident on his florist business card which read, "We take care of you from womb to tomb."

His support of SSND is influenced by his earliest memories. "When I think back to the years I was in school, I remember what I learned that from the sisters. As a result, I have tried to send a donation from my floral shop earnings to this day," he said.

Phil completed his undergraduate education at the University of Michigan and his postgraduate work at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Dental School. Janet earned her undergraduate degree from the University of Nebraska and completed her postgraduate education at the University of

Missouri's School of Physical Therapy. Janet teaches at Washington University in St. Louis.

Along with knowing the sisters on a personal level as patients, Phil has worked with the sisters in his role as president of the board of directors for The Housing Partnership, an organization in St. Louis providing homes and residential services to low-income families. Sister Leonette Juengst is a current board member.

Phil and Janet are involved in other charitable organizations, such as the Optimist Club of St. Louis, a service organization that helps local youth. They also participate in social justice efforts through their parish, St. Gabriel the Archangel

The couple shared that when Jerilyn was diagnosed with cancer in the 1980s, the sisters were there to pray for her healing. Today, they feel the sisters' prayers for them every day.


